IMPORTANT NOTICE

HNW members attending 'live' educational events where legally acceptable, please adhere to the following HNW protocols based on government guidance and law.

HNW PROTOCOLS FOR ATTENDING LIVE EVENTS IN COVID-SECURE SETTINGS

1. Please do not attend a live session if you are feeling unwell, have a temperature, a persistent cough or have recently lost your sense of taste or smell or if anyone in your household is similarly unwell.
2. Undertake your own risk assessment and only attend if you are happy to accept the risks. Take particular account of your personal health and situation and those of others in your household or of those who visit you often.
3. Where possible, avoid car sharing with those not in your household.
4. Maintain at least 2m social distancing at all times.
5. Wear a face mask/covering at all times.
6. Bring and use hand sanitiser and antiseptic cleaning wipes.

8. Print your own copies of the music to be played in advance.



For a start we began with a sign language lesson which enabled all of us to wish Carol a very happy birthday. A very useful skill.

On to the music - we alternated between Wendy's and Mary's tutoring. Some lovely pieces, folksy, Christmassy, some familiar, others not so. Definitely NOT SO when we came to Mary's 'ZOOM Again'. What appeared to be very minimalist on the sheet, think Philip Glass and his silences, turned out to be anything but. We swung back and forth between hands, with 8 strikes minim and 16 strikes semibreve on a rising/falling wave of notes. To add more layers, we were divided into three groups and played it all as a round. To make it all a bit harder, there wasn't really a tune, but notes charging after each other. As Mary said, 'It could be a bit of a cacophony'. If you've seen the video, on HNW FB page and website, it turned out to be a very interesting and individual experience as everyone listening could hear their own interpretation of rhythms appearing. Fascinating to observe, great fun to play. We played it through twice and each time was different. NEWS of OTHER RECENT EVENTS

Ruth Wall Online Concert – 4th September

Ruth Wall's 'unspoken rules' concert was a silver lining in the Covid-19 cloud. The concert was originally intended for a live performance near Hay-on-Wye but online access allowed those of us who would never have attended to enjoy a treat.

Three gorgeous harps were lined up right next to the washing up liquid. Ruth opened with the seductive tango rhythms of Piazzolla on her pedal harp. Next was the tall and angular Bray harp, which was played standing. Ruth explained that slivers of holly wood at the bottom of each string produced the amazing buzzing sound; part sackbut, part sitar and quite unforgettable. Finally was a small wire harp played with the fingernails, fingers pointing upwards and involving a complicated damping action. This had another fantastic sound reminding me of the chime of a mantelpiece clock.

The concert aimed to show pioneering music which challenged the status quo and one piece involved pegs, blue tack, straw and electrical wire added to the harp to produce different effects - buzzes, rattles, the sound of a wooden xylophone and a steel band. Ruth and her husband, Graham Fitkin, performed Steve Reich's clapping music based on repeated 3,2,1,2 rhythms. I could follow the rhythm to start with but as the clapping diverged the effect was far more complicated.

Ruth and Graham perform immaculately as a duet and one of the stand-out pieces for me was 'I Swear, I Swear, I Swear.' Graham was inspired on a train journey by two women sitting behind him having a really good chat. He and Ruth performed the sound of the train on the tracks, the whistle and odd snatch of conversation - 'I Swear, I Swear, I Swear I had five bags!' 'No!'. It really made me laugh. Another fabulous piece was Graham's Victoriana. This involved swan-like, elegant and sweeping arpeggios on the pedal harp. However, Ruth's feet were a busy blur on the pedals, which belied the serenity above. I expected to find the concert a little challenging but it was immensely enjoyable with a lovely range of pieces.
