Step three of the English Road Map out of Lockdown (17th May earliest)

The Government guidance on [Reopening businesses and venues](#) says:

"At this step, both outdoor and indoor gatherings or events, organised by a business, charity, public body or similar organisations, can be organised, subject to specific conditions: that they comply with COVID-Secure guidance including taking reasonable steps to limit the risk of transmission, complete a related risk assessment; and ensure that those attending do not mix beyond what is permitted by the social contact limits (unless another exemption exists, such as for organised sport or exercise, supervised activities for children or a significant life event)."

So, indoor and outdoor rehearsals will be possible in step three with no formal limits on numbers but with some conditions:

- Completing a relevant risk assessment (see COVID secure rehearsals below).
- Having measures in place to mitigate risk (see COVID secure rehearsals below).
- Managing numbers safely within social contact limits: "those attending do not mix beyond what is permitted by the social contact limits..."
 - This means that the total number of people attending a rehearsal can be more than the social contact limit – but that they must always remain in sub-groups within social contact limits.
 - So, indoors the social contact limit at this step will be 6. If your venue would safely allow for 42 people (as an example) to attend, all 42 could attend but they would have to stay in a maximum of 7 sub-groups of 6 people. With no mixing / switching between the sub-groups.
 - Making Music advise that you go further than this and treat everyone as a sub-group of 1 – and don't allow for any mixing. This will mean your rules can be very simple and clear and make the rehearsal much easier to manage.

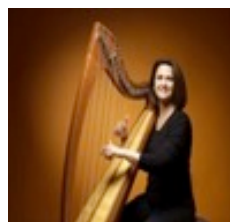

MONTHLY COMPOSITION CHALLENGE – MAY 2021!

Each month we will play around with a new idea or brief for something to try out. Last month we suggested "Changing a nursery rhyme", this month the challenge is to write a couple of bars only using **10ths as an accompaniment**. The bottom note is number one of a chord and the top note is number 10, you can count up the strings to find it. You might notice that it's the same note as the 3rd just more spaced out. Try moving that shape around to find a pattern you like. They are often played with a flat open hand so lend themselves nicely to dampening and staccatos.

In this session we will explore a couple of these haunting sounding melodies in Mary's beautiful arrangements for the harp, inspired by Swedish artist Jonna Jinton's stunning Kulning. **Watch an example here:** <https://youtu.be/kon-h5Z5mdY>

The singing technique called "kulning" is an ancient Swedish herding call, that was used by women a long time ago to call home the cattle (the cows and the goats) back home to the farm in the evenings. It was also used as a form of communication, since the high pitch sounds can be heard through very far distances.

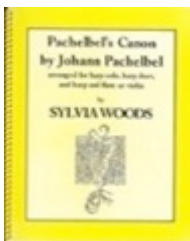
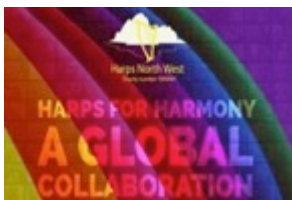

A tribute to Betty Balmain, a founder member of HNW, who sadly, passed away aged 91 in April this year

In May 1993 a group of clarsach players got together aiming to arrange regular playing sessions, and also hoping to encourage interest and involvement from others. This led to the placing of an advertisement in the Cumberland News inviting anyone interested to "come and have a go". I did. Betty became Convenor of the group shortly afterwards, and was an excellent organiser. There were regular meetings, we played background music at various events and venues, and even put on a wee concert at Moffat, Scotland. Betty and I used to go together to the Edinburgh Harp Festival (not yet "International"). But my friendship with Betty flourished further through our love of gardening. Betty was a supreme horticulturalist. She had taught at Newton Rigg, (an Agricultural College in Cumbria) and I discovered recently that her papers are still referred to. She was always willing to come and help me with my large and unruly garden, turning up fork in hand to weed, and always bringing a plant or two. I learnt so much from her.

As the club grew, by now the Cumbria Branch of the Clarsach Society, it was realised that we needed to do some serious fundraising. I think it was almost certainly Betty who suggested a plant sale, and as my garden is people friendly, and conveniently next door to the village hall, we set to. Betty would make at least three trips, her car laden with plants, all raised from her tiny garden in Stainton, near Penrith. Everyone helped. Jane would come down with her marvellous marmalades, jams and chutneys, Jean came and played, and we served tea, coffee and biscuits from the village hall. Over the years we raised a considerable amount, and many people benefitted from those funds. Thank you Betty.

Betty had a very strong and secure faith. Always on parting she would say "God Bless", and you knew she meant it. God bless you, Betty.

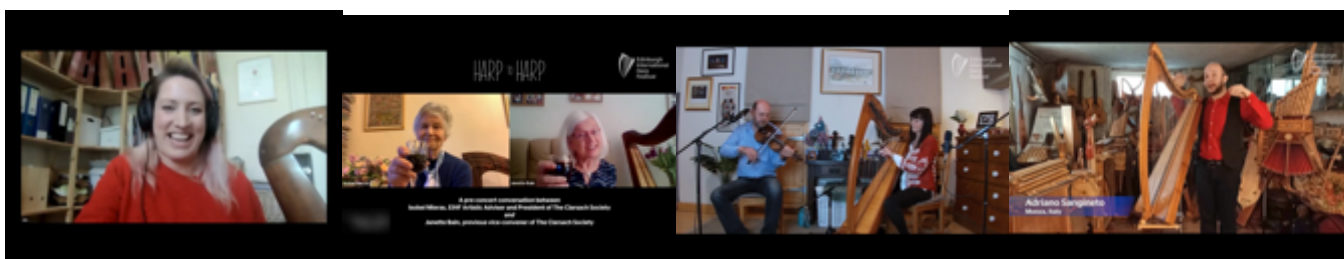
Edinburgh International Harp Festival – April 2021

Look after Your hands and fingers!

During a pleasant woodland walk on Easter Sunday I managed to trip over a bramble. No major damage – or so I thought! My ring finger on my left hand drooped a bit but it wasn't too painful. We strapped it to the next finger and continued. Once home I cut down a lollypop stick and strapped that over the joint and continued to play the harp. My harping friends urged me to get it looked at by medical professionals, but as it didn't hurt too much I did not do so immediately. Two and half weeks went by and it did not seem to get much better so I went to a minor injuries clinic. They were fantastic. After X-rays and a consultation with an orthopaedic specialist it turns out that I have badly bruised the tendon but fortunately it is still attached. It is likely that there is a tiny fracture too. I was strapped into a mallet finger splint and duly told off for not seeking medical help as soon as it happened. I am lucky that the tendon is still attached. It will recover and is already much better than it was. So not playing with the fourth finger of left hand for 6 to 8 weeks is the price for a simple trip. I miss playing properly, but can't wait to get back to full playing capacity.

Do take care!! Don't overlook any injuries to your hands and fingers – as a harpist they are too precious! I was lucky that the damage is not too serious and I will recover. **Gill - Editor**

IMPORTANT NOTICE re Covid-19 restrictions

HNW members attending 'live' events where legally acceptable, please adhere to the following HNW protocols based on government guidance and law.

HNW PROTOCOLS FOR ATTENDING LIVE EVENTS IN COVID-SECURE SETTINGS

HANDS - FACE - SPACE

1. Please do not attend a live session if you are feeling unwell, have a temperature, a persistent cough or have recently lost your sense of taste or smell or if anyone in your household is similarly unwell.
2. Undertake your own risk assessment and only attend if you are happy to accept the risks. Take particular account of your personal health and situation and those of others in your household or of those who visit you often.
3. Where possible, avoid car sharing with those not in your household.
4. Maintain at least 2m social distancing at all times.
5. Wear a face mask/covering when 2m distancing is not possible.

7. **Bring your own refreshments and utensils and do not share. Kitchens will probably not be available.**
8. Print your own copies of the music to be played in advance.
9. Avoid touching other people's property. Wash your hands often.
10. Be familiar with the risk assessment and the specific requirements for each venue you visit.
11. **Respect the decisions of others but do not be afraid to ask others to adhere to the protocols if you feel you are at risk.**

Nominated organisers of HNW events.

Ensure that a specific risk assessment has been carried out for each venue and the activities to be undertaken.

Inform participants of its requirements, especially for registration, entrance and exit and use of toilets.
